

### **Introduction**

Part II of the Dodge County All-Hazards Mitigation Plan provides political, geographical and demographic information on Dodge County. This collection of data must be referenced in order to determine sound hazard mitigation strategies. The resulting information is an important element of the planning process since sound alternative plans cannot be formulated and evaluated without an in-depth knowledge of the relevant condition in the study area.

### **General Geography**

#### **Location**

Dodge County is located in the south central region of Wisconsin (Map 1) and shares its boundaries with seven (7) counties: Columbia, Green Lake, Fond du Lac, Washington, Waukesha, Jefferson and Dane. The largest urban area is the City of Beaver Dam and the smallest urban area is the City of Juneau. Dodge County is divided into 24 townships, 11 villages and 9 cities, 4 of which border adjacent counties. Dodge County is approximately 30 minutes northeast of Madison, 45 minutes northwest of Milwaukee, 2 hours south of Green Bay, 2 hours north of Chicago and approximately 5 hours southeast of the Twin Cities.

#### **Civil Divisions**

There are 44 municipalities (24 towns, 11 villages and 9 cities) in Dodge County and the planning area. These units of government provide the basic structure of the decision-making framework. Dodge County encompasses 906 square miles with four significant waterways in the County: Rock River, Beaver Dam Lake, Fox Lake and Lake Sinissippi. The area and proportion of the County within each civil division are presented in Table 1.

## Demographic and Economic Profile

### Population and Households

The most recent population estimate by the US Census Bureau is for 2003 estimates a population of 87,115 for the County. The 2000 Census reported a population base of 85,897 people. This figure represents about 2 percent of the State's population. Approximately 48 percent of the population is urban residents and 52 percent are rural. Since 1990, the population of Dodge County has increased by 10.9 percent or by 10,556 people. That rate of increase in population was faster than many other areas of the state. If the growth rate continued at this same level, there will be approximately 95,234 people in Dodge County in 2010 and 105,614 people in 2020. Table 2 reflects the population of counties adjacent to Dodge County.

Population concentrations and trends are important when prioritizing hazard mitigation strategies. The City of Beaver Dam is the most densely populated and developed area in the County. Other areas of population include the City of Mayville and parts of the cities of Watertown and Waupun. Map 2 (Land Use) shows the areas of population concentrations in the County.

Between 1990 and 2000, most communities within Dodge County have experienced and increase in their population base (refer to Table 3). The greatest amount of growth occurred in the Village of Theresa with a 38.4 percent increase between 1990 and 2000.

### Employment

Employment throughout Dodge County is diverse, demonstrating the skills of a motivated workforce. Dodge County's ten largest industry groups provide roughly 54 percent of the jobs in the county. Fabricated metal product manufacturing is the principal area of employment in Dodge County. This is followed by machinery manufacturing, food manufacturing and educational services.

Identifying locations of large employers is important when prioritizing hazard mitigation strategies. Table 4 represents the top ten employers in Dodge County and their locations.

### Land Values

The value of the real estate and personal property in a community reflects the upper end of the potential for property damages in each community. The annual equalized value of each municipality represents the Department of Revenue estimate of market value (agricultural land is included at use value) of all taxable property. Property tax levies of jurisdictions are apportioned to each municipality on the basis of equalized value. Table 5 lists each municipality's total equalized values for real estate, personal property, and all property and the percent each municipality represents of the county's total.

### **Land Use/Land Cover and Development Patterns**

Land use is an important determinant in the potential impact a particular hazard may have, and the actions which may be taken to mitigate the hazard impacts. An understanding of the amount, type, and spatial distribution of urban and rural land uses within the County is an important consideration in the development of a sound hazard mitigation plan.

The Dodge County Planning and Development Department has categorized land use in Dodge County into fourteen classifications. Map 2 shows the general land use and surface water in Dodge County. Table 6 shows the acreage and percentage for land use designations of each classification.

### **Agriculture**

The dominant land use in Dodge County is agriculture. Agricultural land in the County covers approximately seventy percent of the County's land area. The main agricultural practices in the County are cash crop and dairy farming. Agricultural land is scattered throughout the county. According to the Wisconsin Agricultural Statistic Service (2002), Dodge County has approximately 404,054 acres of farmland.

### **Residential Development**

Land in residential development makes up approximately two percent of the total county area. Residential concentrations are scattered throughout the county. Much of the scattered rural development is related to direct recreational demand as various types of housing have clustered along streams and lakes.

There are a number of mobile home parks in the county. According to the U.S. Census, there were 1,567 mobile homes in 2000. This is significant due to their vulnerability in natural hazards, especially tornadoes. Map 14 displays the mobile home concentrations within the county.

### **Commercial and Industrial Development**

Commercial and industrial development makes up about 0.54 percent of the total area of the County. Land use for commercial and industrial development is also scattered throughout the County. The largest commercial and industrial area in the County is located in the Beaver Dam area.

### **Transportation**

The transportation system of Dodge County provides the basis for movement of goods and people into, out of, through, and within the County. An efficient transportation system is essential to the sound social and economic development of the County and region. The analysis of transportation routes should be considered in the possible event of the major accidents or spills of hazardous materials, accounting for as much as 94 percent of all hazardous material shipments nationwide according to USDOT.

Highways link Dodge County with some of Wisconsin's major cities, including: Portage, Madison, Milwaukee and Green Bay. They are arteries which feed Dodge County's workforce, visitors, goods, and resources. Map 3 shows the Dodge County transportation system. The County is served by thirteen State highways (49, 68, 33, 73, 16, 60, 26, 89, 19, 28, 67, 175, and 115) which encompass approximately 250 miles. The main State highways divide the county into sectors. Highway 49 runs east to west, along the Dodge/Fond du Lac County border. Highway 19 also runs east to west along the Dodge/Jefferson County border. Highway 33 runs east to west dividing the county into northern and southern regions. Highway 60 also runs east to west dividing the southern region of the County once again. Highway 26 runs north to south dividing the county into eastern and western regions. Highway 67 also runs north to south further dividing the eastern portion of the county. Two US Highways (151 and 41) serve the county. US Highway 151 runs diagonally through the western portion of the county. US Highway 41 runs north and south through the eastern portion of the township of Lomira. The County also maintains an additional 550 miles of county highways. In addition to the State and County highway system, there are approximately 1,800 miles of local roads. All this encompasses a total of 2,600 miles of road network.

Four railroads serve Dodge County. Although trucks transport most of the hazardous materials in the State and U.S., rail can carry significantly larger and various loads. The Wisconsin Southern Railroad runs diagonally through the county coming out of the City of Hartford and runs northwest to the City of Waupun with two spurs dividing in the Village of Iron Ridge going north to the City of Mayville and another dividing in the City of Horicon going west to the City of Beaver Dam. The Union Pacific Railway also runs diagonally across the county from the southern portion of the township of Clyman northwest to the Village of Randolph. The Canadian Pacific Rail System runs westerly from the southeast portion of the township of Lowell to the City of Columbus. Another small railway, Central Ltd. which is now owned by Canadian National, runs north to south (parallel to State Highway 67/175) in the township of Lomira. An abandoned railway, which has been converted into a recreation trail, runs north to south parallel to State Highway 26 and starts at the State Highway 60 access point and continues on across the Dodge/Fond du Lac County border.

The County contains only one airport, Dodge County Airport, which is centrally located north of the City of Juneau and serves the entire county. The airport has two runways, is lighted and equipped for instrumental landing.

### **Surface Water**

Dodge County has a total surface area of approximately 559,461 acres, however, 126,917 acres (22.68%) is comprised of surface water (see Map 4). The majority of this area is comprised of twelve named lakes and 1,500 unnamed waterbodies (stream segments, retention ponds, portions of the Horicon Marsh, etc.) totaling 13,449 acres and 2,087.5 acres, respectively. The largest natural lake is Fox Lake at 2,800 acres and the largest artificial water body is Beaver Dam Lake at 6,847 acres. The deepest lake is Collins Lake, which measures approximately 20 feet at its deepest point. The County contains approximately 405.6 miles or 147.5 acres of streams approximately 3' wide.

Dodge County contains thirteen watersheds located throughout the County. Map 4 represents the watershed boundaries. The watersheds are as follows:

### **Floodplain**

The primary value of floodplains is their role in natural flood control. Floodplains represent areas where excess water can be accommodated whether through drainage by streams or through storage by watersheds and other natural detention/retention areas. Specific areas that will be inundated will depend upon the amount of water, the distance and speed that water travels, and the topography of the area. If uninterrupted by development, the areas shown on a map as floodplains should be able to handle the severest (regional) flood (i.e. those that have a probability of occurring once every 100 years).

There is a value in preserving and protecting these natural flood control areas from encroachment. First, by preventing development in the floodplain, the cost of building dikes, levies, or other man-made flood control devices will be saved. Second, for each structure that is constructed in a flood prone area, that flood prone area expands, potentially subjecting other structures originally built outside the delineated flood hazard area to the risk of flooding. Each new structure (or modification to existing buildings) placed in the floodplain puts more life and property in danger.

Counties, cities and villages are required to adopt reasonable and effective floodplain zoning ordinances. The requirement is found in Section 87.30 of the Wisconsin Statutes and Chapter NR 116 of the Wisconsin Administrative Code. Floodplain zoning is designed to protect individuals, private property and public investments from flood damage.

Floodplain zoning maps identify areas where major floods occur. Regulations prohibit development in the floodway, the most dangerous flood area. In other flood areas, the flood fringe, development that is built above flood levels and otherwise flood-protected is allowed if it is in accordance with local ordinances. For regulatory purposes, a floodplain is generally defined as land where there is a one percent chance of flooding in any year (also known as the 100-year floodplain).

In order to participate in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) National Flood Insurance Program, the County and its cities and villages have completed a Flood Insurance Study and a Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) that encompasses Dodge County. This FIRM delineates the "A" Zones including the floodway and flood fringe which are those areas inundated by the 100-year flood within the County. Map 4 shows the approximate floodplains in Dodge County. Floodplains in Dodge County are small and floods occur only during periods of exceptionally heavy rainfall.

### **Wetlands**

Wetlands perform many indispensable roles in the proper function of the hydrologic cycle and local ecological systems. In terms of hazard mitigation, they act as water storage devices in times of high water. Like sponges, wetlands are able to absorb excess water and release it back into the watershed slowly, preventing flooding and minimizing flood damage. As more impermeable surfaces are developed, this excess capacity for water runoff storage becomes increasingly important.

The DNR has also identified the location of wetlands on their WISCLAND database. According to this, Dodge County has 126,917 acres, or 18.15 percent of its total area. Map 4 shows these wetland areas in Dodge County. There are concentrations of wetlands in Dodge County including the Horicon Marsh State Wildlife Area, Theresa Marsh, Waterloo Wildlife Area, Mud Lake, Rock River, Crawfish River, Beaver Dam Lake, Fox Lake, Lake Sinissippi, Lake Emily and Neosho Pond. Additional wetlands are associated with the floodplains discussed above, however, smaller wetlands are scattered throughout the County.

Eradication of wetlands can occur through the use of fill material. This can destroy the hydrological function of the site and open the area to improper development. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has promulgated minimum standards for managing wetlands.

### **Utilities**

Utility systems are important in hazard mitigation planning because of the dependency on water, wastewater treatment, gas service, electricity and communications. Because of this reliance and vulnerability to hazards, utility systems must be identified for this Plan.

The protection of the public water supply facilities from potential contamination from hazards, such as flooding, is a consideration for hazard mitigation planning. Dodge County has 21 municipalities that manage water and waste water services through a public system. The City of Beaver Dam is the largest system located in the County. Other systems include Randolph, Fox Lake, Waupun, Juneau, Clyman, Reeseville, Lowell, Horicon, Mayville, Hustisford, Leroy, Knowles, Brownsville, Lomira, Theresa, Iron Ridge, Neosho, Ashippun and Burnett.

The protection of the wastewater facilities is an important consideration for hazard mitigation planning because of its potential to contaminate nearby waterbodies in the event of high water.

Also of concern during periods of flooding is the threat of damage to infrastructure of associate facilities.

Koch Pipeline Company provides a pipeline to move petroleum through the County. The pipeline runs northwest and is located in the southwest area of the County.

The infrastructure of electric and telephone lines should be considered in the events of high winds, ice storms, tornadoes, flooding, and fire. Maps 10 through 13 show those provider service areas.

Five electric/gas providers: Alliant Energy, Wisconsin Electric Power Company, Adams-Columbia Rural Electric, Juneau Utilities and Hustisford Utilities service Dodge County. Alliant Energy is the largest gas service provider, while Wisconsin Electric Power Company is the largest electric supplier. See Maps 11 and 12.

Seven telephone providers: Ameritech/SBC, GTE/Verizon, Dodge County Cable, CenturyTel, Riverside Telecommunications, TDS Metrocom and Charter Communications service the county. Ameritech/SBC is the largest supplier. See Map 13.

### **Emergency Services and Facilities**

The type and location of public emergency services are an important consideration in hazard mitigation planning, because of the potential direct involvement of such facilities in certain hazard situations. The location of fire stations, police departments and ambulance services in Dodge County are shown on Maps 5 through 7.

There are 28 fire stations that serve the local units of government in Dodge County. The Beaver Dam Fire Department provides a full-time fire chief, while the remainder of the departments rely on volunteers for this service. The location of each of the fire stations and fire service areas are on Map 5.

There are 20 ambulance service providers to the County. The locations of ambulance service areas are on Map 6.

The Dodge County Sheriff's Department provides law enforcement service to all municipalities. The County has 3 road sergeants, 7 investigators, 28 full-time officers, 12 part-time officers, and 12 dispatchers. The city of Beaver Dam has a full-time dispatch center, while the cities of Horicon and Mayville provide only part-time dispatch services. The County provides dispatch to the cities of Horicon, Mayville, Fox Lake and Juneau; the villages of Lomira, Theresa, Hustisford, Lowell Randolph and Reeseville; and the townships of Ashippun, Beaver Dam, Emmet, Fox Lake, Hustisford, Lebanon, Neosho, Rubicon and Shields. The locations of police service areas are on Map 7.

To coordinate these services, Dodge County has created an Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), updated in 2005. This provides a general overview for county and municipal emergency response personnel during response to a number of disasters. This document serves to coordinate the County and local units of government during times of response and recovery. It also provides a link between the County and municipal plans.

**Critical Community Facilities**

In addition to emergency service facilities, other community facilities that are of importance in hazard mitigation planning including schools, hospitals, nursing homes, and government administration buildings. Maps 8 and 9 shows the location of selected types of critical community facilities within Dodge County.

Table 7 lists critical community facilities that were identified by the municipalities.
